The Appalachian Ministries Educational Resource Center (AMERC) was founded in 1985 by Dr. Mary Lee Daugherty. The Appalachian Ministries Educational Resource Center (AMERC) is an ecumenical non-profit organization devoted to preparing church leaders for effective ministry in Appalachia and other rural areas. AMERC enables the training of persons for Christian leadership in Appalachia and similar rural and urban settings through funding, resourcing and consultation. Prior to 2000, AMERC conducted travel seminars and summer courses based out of its office in Berea, Kentucky. Courses are now organized by AMERC consortium member schools who receive grant funding from AMERC. Seminars sponsored by AMERC have focused on issues such as small church pastoring, religious and social contexts of Appalachia, economic systems of rural America, community development, and living in healthy balance with the land.

AMERC funds educational seminars that share this objective. Grant money is available only to members of the AMERC consortium, although participation of individual students from other theological schools is encouraged. 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Since October 1946, thousands of women and men from all over the world and every Christian confession and culture have come to the World Council of Churches (WCC) Ecumenical Institute of Bossey for seminars, conferences, and the Graduate School of Ecumenical Studies. Many have testified to life changing experiences in this "ecumenical laboratory" and groups of Bossey alumni have been formed in many countries.

Course offerings include one and three-week spring/early summer seminars and a three-month course of more serious study from September to December. Students receive a certificate of study with the most significant one being the three-month coursework. This is a time for learning about the world's religions, meeting people who lead the World Church organizations, and visiting nearby World Council of Church offices.
