DOCTOR OF MINISTRY LOUISVILLE SEMINARY

The Doctor of Ministry program strives to reflect the Church's vocation to bear witness to the grace of the triune God as shown in Jesus Christ, and continues Louisville Seminary's long history of reaching across cultural, racial, and religious divides. The DMin program strengthens the connection between theology and ministry practice in the Church or in fields closely related to the mission and witness of the church, while fostering the spiritual and professional growth of participants. Core professors work with experienced practitioners to build face-to-face communities of learning in which students study cutting-edge theological, biblical, and practical bases of ministry; share collective wisdom, curiosity, and experience; and complete a Research Project that informs and enhances their current ministry.



An advanced, professional degree, the DMin is designed for experienced practitioners who have a Master of Divinity degree or its equivalent from an ATS-accredited school, along with a minimum GPA of 3.0 and significant ministry experience (either a minimum of three years post MDiv experience or at least five years of consistent professional ministry experience prior to application).

The program is fully accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) and the Association of Theological Schools (ATS).

PLAN OF STUDY

The Louisville Seminary Doctor of Ministry degree is a 36-credit-hour program consisting of a series of four Foundational Seminars, a total of three elective courses that can include both independent study courses and APM (Advanced Practice of Ministry) courses in any configuration, and a Final Research Project that addresses a significant issue in ministry. The program is designed to be completed in three years.
